



re: Proposed changes to the Local Government Act

Dear Editor,

Proposed changes to the Local Government Act will pave the way for local councils to be amalgamated into a Taranaki supercouncil.

The South Taranaki, Stratford and New Plymouth District Councils are making submissions to the parliamentary committee considering the amendment, criticising parts of the bill that take away fundamental ratepayer rights.

Under the plan, the amendment would change the way votes on amalgamation would be conducted. It would give the Government ministerial powers of intervention. This is nothing new. In 1986 the Lange govern-

ment forced amalgamation on many local councils. In most areas residents made it quite clear they were happy with their local officials and the bodies they administered.

Their wishes were totally ignored by the Local Government Commission, which was headed by Mr Brian Elwood. In an interview in the NZ Times on January 12 1986, Mr Elwood told Linda Clark " ... We' ve been put here to do a difficult job There is no doubt about that. But we are not going to tum our backs on the problems. If the local authorities can't come up with a workable solution we will present them with our proposal and we'll

talk. And if there is still no agreement we will force our proposal on them. In the few instances where local people were allowed a referendum on amalgamation it was stipulated by the government that if the people did not want amalgamation the number of NO votes had to be 50% or more of all registered voters. In effect, this meant that those who did not vote, including people who had died but were still on the roll, were counted as YES votes. So much for democracy in action under that Labour government, and this present National government is promoting the same thing 26 years later.

The Taranaki Herald on

August 12 1987 reported: "Dead Still Vote" A group of Auckland Mayors has banded together to try and stop dead people from voting for local body mergers. They say that under the law, dead people still on the electoral rolls will have their non-votes counted as votes for a merger in any poll held on the issue.

The Mayor of East Coast Bays, Mr Jack Hinton, likened the forced amalgamations to what happened in National Socialist Germany in the 1930 under Adolf Hitler. (Shore Times May 29, 1986) Wake up New Zealand!





Taranaki Animal Protection Trust

The recently formed Taranaki Animal Protection Trust has two arms. One is a sanctuary for homeless animals in the Okato area and the other is a shop in New Plymouth called 'The Cat's Pyjamas' in Hayton Lane (opposite Centre City), which is the main fundraiser for the Trust.

Okato Animal Sanctuary

Although such animals as dogs are catered for (they have eight at present), most animals at the sanctuary are cats – about thirty of them currently. The facility is run by Bronwyn, who is Secretary of the Trust. The cats are housed in new, very pleasant spacious facilities, which are well lit by natural lighting. The cats looked well fed and relaxed, many catnapping in specially designed cat hammocks.

Some of the cats leave the sanctuary building daily to explore the 2.5 acres property and return to their housing to eat and sleep. (They know they are on to a good thing). All seem to have names, such as an old cat 'Tigger' whose elderly owner died. Bronwyn gave me a detailed description of several - including how she came to acquire

Many of the cats have come from 'colonies' – humanely trapped. Each cat has been dealt with by a vet, including deworming, defleaing and desexing.

The colonies themselves, most of them on industrial sites and beach locations on the outskirts of New Plymouth, are formed when dumped cats have successive litters of kittens. Life is hard in the colonies. The Trust aims to help break the cycle



by bringing aged cats into the sanctuary to live out their lives and rehoming the more recently, younger, often pregnant and ex domestic cats.

As funds allow, the Trust assists with community desexing of cats. Slowing the kitten proliferation is an important aim. Bronwyn explains that the Trust is keen to outline what they are doing and why - an educational role. Many people get kittens because they are cute and cuddly, but they forget to have them desexed and their beautiful little kitten will be a breeder when it matures at five months. Bronwyn plans to visit schools to outline the problems to future generations explaining the consequences of not having their cats fixed.

The Trust was started in order to help a lady who has been feeding, trapping and desexing colony cats for the past 14 years with the help of some understanding friends, but the problem proved overwhelming and that is why Bronwyn stepped in and set her sanctuary with the aid of Paula Allan's much appreciated financial backing.

"We do not euthanize cats", explains Bronwyn as we know from experience that so-called wild cats can be domesticated, such as "wild as hell" Carlos who now sleeps on Bronwyn and her husband's bed at night.

The Trust has various plans for the future, including extending the sanctuary premises. In addition, they will be putting a proposal to the New Plymouth District Council for financial help

to ensure a bigger, more effective programme. They want to know more about the colonies and to have the means to deal with about 100

cats a year. However, in the meantime the Trust needs donations, which can include the relatively painless AP (Automatic Payment) system. They also need a few volunteers to do work at the sanctuary such as cleaning. Importantly they would like several more people to become Trustees. For example, one or two with bookkeeping skills would be appreciated.



Charter schools: the way to class dunce

The government's charter schools policy is one of the most cynical, ideologicallydriven exercises we've seen in a long, long time.

This was the policy that was never mentioned during the election campaign last year, and now it's being billed as one of the flagship policies over the next three years.

You know there's something wrong when they have to change the name of a policy before it starts, because now they want us to call charter schools "partnership

schools".

Charter schools are schools set up by churches or businesses or any other 'sponsor' to do whatever the sponsor wants. The school doesn't have to follow the accepted curriculum. They don't have to offer NCEA as long as they have a qualification "recognised by industry".

These aren't the only things they won't have to do. Last week, the minister announcing details of the charter schools project, John Banks, said the schools wouldn't even need to have qualified teachers. Principals of these schools also won't have to have any educational qualifications.

Yet New Zealand's education system today performs well when measured against other developed countries. Our maths, science and reading achievement ranks among the top performers.

And our education system is versatile. Over the last 20 years we've added kōhanga reo and kura kaupapa as well as a number of schools with

alternative learning environments, both at the primary and secondary level.

So what is this really all about?

For one thing, it is not about greater diversity. The current system already allows for alternative approaches to education.

Nor is it about helping those in poorer communities. The focus of the policy is on the sponsor, not on those pupils who might need more help to succeed in school.

There are two reasons for this policy.

The first is that it is part of the old-style, mad market ideology of 20 years ago.

We saw what happened with building deregulation in the 1990s. Construction and product standards dropped and we wound up with leaky buildings. Skill levels also fell as unqualified labour was allowed to do the work of properly trained builders.

Now they want to do the same with education.

They think that all that is needed to be a good teacher

is a bubbly personality. No need to worry about teaching methods and assessment, nor about child and adolescent brain development.

The second reason is the decades-old antipathy between the National Party and teachers, especially teacher unions. They stopped treating them as professionals long ago when teachers started challenging National Party policy. Never mind that teachers have been pretty good at challenging Labour Party policy with as much gusto.

The truth is we put the teaching profession in front of our kids every day. Teachers cannot presently teach without a tertiary qualification and clearance from the police, which is the way it should be. We're only young once, and what we learn in our formative years sets us up for the rest of our life. There needs to be proper standards and oversight of education.

Charter schools will make New Zealand the classroom dunce to the rest of the world.

Conscience votes and the local MP

Conscience votes are something many members of parliament struggle with as they seek to dance on the head of a pin around what they think and what may be palatable within the electorate they represent. List MPs can always just tow a party line, if there is one, albeit thinly disguised as a conscience vote. We have seen enormous pressure put

on individual MPs who have wanted to take a different line from their Leader in the past. I cite conservative MPs in the Labour Party caucus who bore the brunt of heavy lobby-fire from the Liberal wing of the Labour Party lead by then leader and Prime Minister Helen Clarke over issues such as Civil Unions and the Section 59 debate.

Conscience votes require MPs to exercise his/her conscience. MPs should reflect who they are and so their conscience vote should never come as a surprise to anybody. The challenge then is to allow the communities they represent to know them sufficiently so that there is no surprise when these votes are counted.

With a little bit of research any constituent would know that I am an ex-cop, exlawyer, provincially raised, rurally based, Presbyterian lay-preacher, who can be a bit rough 'round the edges. Hopefully more 'smart on crime' than tub-thumping 'tough on crime' and fairly liberal given I represent the conservative National Party as well as the good folk of the Whanganui Electorate between the Whangaehu and Stoney Rivers. My votes on conscience issues should reflect that; if not, I get the order of the boot next election. This week we saw four Bills

pulled from the ballot for debate. Gay Marriage; \$15 Minimum Wage; Mondayizing memorial days; and doubling maternity leave.

My views on the above new Bills up for debate are as follows.

I disagree with doubling Maternity leave to 26 weeks. It is expensive, and I believe the responsibility for raising children should fall on the mum and dad of a child, albeit there is support from the community for those parents to make ends meet if needs be. I'd also note that after nine years in Government, with all the money in the world to do it, Labour never increased it before.

I don't agree with a minimum wage of \$15 at the moment, again due to cost and the inflationary costs it would have for employers. Minimum wage on a public holiday would require an employer to pay \$52 per hour to cover the costs of employment for the day. Labour never addresses this issue when promoting a rise in the minimum wage.

I also don't agree that all memorial days should trigger the following Monday off if they fall on a weekend. ANZAC Day commemorates the sacrifice of others. I did nothing to earn it, cause it, or help. Remembering that sacrifice is what is required and I don't need a day off to do it.

My faith based view on gay marriage is that marriage is an institution between a man and a woman. I have no problem with changing the law so that committed homosexual couples' relationships have the same legal status as marriage, because loving couples should be committed to one another, but they'll have to call it something else. On the face of it I won't be voting for the Bill allowing marriage between members of the same sex.

Having gone out on that limb I expect members of various political parties will smack me round a bit, but that comes with the job. 



"Our belief is that health should be appreciated in a holistic way; inner health and outer beauty go hand in hand," explains Kim.

Haven is now open 9am to 4pm, Tuesday to Friday.

Along with a wide range of quality products including: vitamins, minerals and homeopathy (catering from babies to the elderly), Kim is also increasing the range of quality lines, including products such as natural shampoos and conditioners, as well as lotus oils and bath salts. Another new product is Dr Bronner's Fair Trade soaps. For those with a sweet tooth, but a dairy intolerance, there is delicious dairyfree chocolate on offer. Where possible Kim prefers to buy New Zealand-made products, if she can source them. She also prefers the organic production of products.

Not here yet, but arriving soon are the Dr Hauschka natural care skin products range, which should be popular. Also, Opi Gel Nails, the manicure that lasts for two weeks, will be available soon. Greeting cards containing musical CDs are expected late August.

Crystals have been sold in the past, but Kim has increased the number and variety of these.

The range of books on offer has also been increased, with the emphasis on New Age. The lending library is still available - there is no charge for this service. Some of the titles include 'Total Detoxification', 'Eating for Energy' and 'Fit for Life'.

Apart from the products you can buy over the counter, there are many services provided at The Health Haven, such as facials, spray tans, waxing, ear candling, massage and even some specials for the month of August. Owner Kelvin Jordan has bought the former Rahotu *Takeaways building next door to his business.

"I was sick and tired of finding myself working on the side of the road because of a full workshop," says Kelvin. The new building will virtually double his workshop area.

Largest remaining wetland named

An area of native bush in Kina Road, which is to be preserved in perpetuity, was named in a special ceremony on Thursday July 12. The area which encompasses 20 hectares and is the largest remaining wetland forest in the Taranaki Ring Plain has been given the name Pipiriki. The name reflects the area's association with Whanganui Maori who would pass through the locality en route

The land originally be-

longed to Te Tuahu Waiwiri and his wife Mere Waiti Te Wehenga Tahuna who farmed the area in the late 1880s. Not all of the land however was cleared for farming and the area of bush that remains which passed onto their seven children is. thanks to the benevolence of the family, to be preserved and protected in a partnership with local authorities that includes the South Taranaki District Council

to Parihaka. and the Taranaki Regional

South Taranaki Mayor Ross Dunlop planting one of the symbolic plants.

Council.

Beginning at the Te Potaka Marae at Oaonui, a large group of people which included South Taranaki Mayor Ross Dunlop and TeUraura Nganeko - a representative from Ngatitara Hapu and a descendent of the original owners - gathered for afternoon tea before moving on to the area off Kina Road which has been fenced off from farmland leased by Andrew and Suzie Pentelow. Andrew, is the fourth generation of Pentelows to farm the land. Also present was Andrew's uncle Len Pentelow who farms property further down Kina Road where he too grew up.

Len recalled the entire area once being covered by bush.

As those present gathered on the consecrated land Reverend Albie Martin gave a karakia blessing the area. Then Bobbie Grey from Whanganui spoke at length on the spiritual and historical significance of the land. As he concluded his address he noted the Four Square bag used to transport one of several trees to be planted and made a

quip about old meeting new which raised a few laughs. Several small saplings, gifts from the kinfolk at Whanganui in recognition of their historical connection with

the area, were then planted. Before the orange setting sun, the troop of people

made their way back to Kina Road concluding a spiritual experience.





The Search for Anne Perry - a book review



Perry – a book review The Search for Anne Perry by Joanne Drayton.

The search for Anne Published by Harper Collins, Auckland (2012).

Anne Perry is an awardwinning writer whose books

sell in the millions. Most of her books are crime thrillers - think of Agatha Christie and NZ's Ngaio Marsh. A

while ago she was recipient of a million dollar deal for some of her stories to be televised in Great Britain. Her televised audience also numbers in the millions.

However, Anne Perry is not the name she was born with. Many years earlier, the writer as fifteen-year-old Juliet Hulme was involved in the 1954 murder of her sixteen-year-old friend Pauline Rieper's mother, Honorah. The motive – the two close friends thought Honorah would try to ensure they were finally separated (Although it's a bit more complicated than that!).

The trial in Christchurch was sensational as the medical and psychiatric experts argued as to whether the two girls were bad, mad or both. Their attempts to cover their crime, committed in Victoria Park high up in the Port Hills above Christchurch, was naïve, with Pauline's diary full of incriminating entries to be later used as evidence.

Both girls were found guilty and spent about five years in various prisons, such as Pararoa and Mt Eden. Ironically their crime ensured that they would be separated. Apart from a tiny fraction of their sentences, most of their time was served in separate prisons.

However, experts can be and often are – wrong. Neither girl was incurably bad (despite their horrific crime) or insane. Both have led decent lives and made a positive contribution to society. Both are deeply religious. Pauline, launched

with another name (Hillary Nathan), had a riding school in the UK and retired as deputy principal of a school for special needs children. Juliet - now Anne - currently lives in Scotland, is a thoroughly respected member of society who contributes generously to charity.

Soon after the Peter Jackson film 'Heavenly Creatures' (about the case and people involved) was released, Anne was 'sprung'. She was profoundly shocked her worst fears realised. Both her friends and associates, realising than the well-known writer was totally reformed, stood by her. She has given interviews and tried to explain why she acted as she did as a teenager. However, she declined to go on the Oprah Winfrey show in the US. She also has survived some vicious – even unfair - press.

This book is a fairly sympathetic account (352 pages), based on Joanne Drayton spending time with the writer, as well as thorough research. The biography has many (47) interesting photographs both past and present.

The book sheds light on Anne Perry's intriguing life - both current and previous. It is an absorbing read and well worth the effort. I bought this book at Whitcoulles in Centre City, New Plymouth.

Writing competition considers the role of science in our future

Writers are being invited to submit their thoughts about the contribution of science to the future of New Zealand in this year's Royal Society of New Zealand Manhire Prize for Creative Science Writing competition.

This is New Zealand's only literary award for science writing, and carries cash prizes of \$2500 for each of the non-fiction and fiction categories.

The theme for the 2012 competition is inspired by the late Sir Paul Callaghan who saw the transit of Venus in June as symbolising a new chapter in New Zealand's history. His vision was to make this country a place "where talent wants to live".

Prize-winning poet and fiction writer, Bill Manhire, after whom the competition is named, says: "The Transit of Venus Project was started by Sir Paul soon after he became ill in 2008. Paul was passionate in his belief that only science and scholarship will achieve our desired economic, social and environmental futures. As science was intertwined in the history of our nation, so it will forge its future."

The writing competition has been running since 2007 and aims to encourage exciting science writing. Entries are judged on their literary merits and how accessible they are to the general public.

Past winners of the competition include Dave Armstrong, Alice Miller and Tina Makereti. This year's judge is Steve Braunias, author of books and TV series, columnist, journalist

and editor.

The Manhire Prize Creative Science Writing competition is a partnership between the Royal Society of New Zealand and the Institute of Modern Letters at Victoria University.

Entry forms can be found on the Royal Society of New Zealand website. Closing date for entries is 5 October 2012.

door, either night. The cost is \$5 for adults and \$2 for children.


Clive says he expects a big range in themes - ranging from fairy stories to adaptations of the major playwright's works.
