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





Chester Burrows, MP for Whanganui, appears to be elated with the new opportunities offered to him by the Prime Minister, Mr Key, in the formation of the new government. Chester claims that the memory of the day he got 'the call' will stick with him forever saying, "I was at home last Thursday rebuilding a fence – a job that has needed doing for some time - when the cell phone rang. The Prime Minister offered me a place in his Executive as Minister of Courts and Associate Ministers of Welfare and Justice."

I grabbed the opportunity with both hands and said 'yes' and 'thanks' several times "to a boss who has shown his stature and wisdom as a leader over the past six years in Opposition and in government. Chester explained that as Minister of Courts there *Continued page 3*











Coastal Care Health Centre

I note with concern the muted plans, as published in the Taranaki Daily News on December 12th, 2011, to locate the proposed Coastal Care Health Centre next to the Cottage Rest home. My understanding is, although I was unable to attend the recent public meeting, that there is considerable unease at the chosen location, with many preferring a closer, more accessible location to the centre of the town.

are some on-going projects and issues regarding earthquake strengthening and some temporary court closures while the rebuilds go on. There is also a review of the Family Court and other courts processes. The implementation of the Courts Modernisation legislation transacted last year will be a big job especially as those within the sector get used to doing things differently, and change is never popular. But the biggest challenge, he claimed, is to enable those at the centre of our justice system - offenders and victims – to answer for themselves the question most commonly asked in our Courts, "What the hell just happened?" He went on to say that

"It is an indictment on our legal system to think that people can be in the middle of a process, which invariably alters and affects their lives for the foreseeable future or frequently forever and yet need the outcome explained to them, usually more than once. The Court involves its own jargon, its own language, and its own conventions which are not replicated in any other part of society - and bear no resemblance to the day to day lives of those the system most affects." He stated that "It is no easy thing to change the language, the configuration of the Court themselves, or the manner in which the business of justice is done. But the responsibility of making it understood rests on all the players in the system and ultimately with the Minister."

The role of Associate Minister of Social Development will involve wearing a number of hats but will include Youth Justice as a responsibility, something apparently close to Chester's heart. He maintains that this also fits neatly into the role of Associate Minister of Justice because the connection between those who fail in our justice system, and are supported through our welfare system, is usually very close. Further, he says that "Energy and resources spent through the welfare budget pays dividends in savings -both financial and human -in our Justice/Corrections/ Law and Order endeavours."

Chester has concluded that "None of this is rocket science, but frequently the most simple of objectives can become very difficult to realise, given the machinations and mysteries of bureaucracy" and that " the biggest challenge, on a personal level, as a Minister of the Crown, is to 'keep it real." "The electorate work I am

involved with on a day to day basis does just that. It is



where the ethereal nature of making policy hits the reality of daily grind", claims Chester, concluding that "He is grateful for the opportunity to work in this way."





A warning when swimming

A local high school student was swept into a large pipe while swimming recently. Fortunately she suffered only minor injuries.

The heat of summer has charged upon us in recent days. Consequently we are returning to our favourite water holes to cool down. Once such place frequented in Opunake is the diversion canal which allows water to be taken from the weir in the Waiaua River to Lake Opunake. This appears deep, calm and cooling but the reality can be quite different. Just before the canal water reaches the lake, there is a control gate on the bank. Underneath the bank a large pipe allows water to flow back to the Waiaua, taking sand and silt with it. The water flow is controlled by the opening or closing of the control gate. Unfortunately on Monday December 5 a local high school girl was swept down into this pipe by the outgoing water, and spilled out onto the rocks at the pipe exit. Fortunately she suffered surprisingly light injuries. Warning signs have been posted on the gate shed in the past, but have been repeatedly ripped down.

They warned that this was not a safe place to swim. This incident highlights this and all Opunake residents are reminded to stay out of the diversion canal. There are also warning signs at the screens where water is drawn from the lake down into the generating tunnel. Make sure you choose a safe place to cool off from the summer heat. The diversion canal into Lake Opunake is not one of these places.

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A long week in politics



Well a week is a long time in politics and it can seem a longer time for some of us. The machinations of MMP mean that unless one part gets more than half the seats available, there will need to be a deal done to ensure 'confidence and supply' - in other words that the government will be able to keep supplying the money to run the country and its budget won't get voted down. The upshot of that would be another election because votes are traditionally taken at various times through the term of a government including when the government moves its budget each May. The leader of the Opposition always opposes the motion moving the budget and moves a counter that there is no confidence in the government. The Prime

Minister needs to outvote this counter from the Opposition or the government fails and the country goes back to the polls.

It seems an indictment on MMP then that after the best result of any government since 1951- obviously the best result under MMP - we were still a week forming a government and maybe another week forming a Cabinet. It is nevertheless unsurprising given the German example, where after 17 MMP elections there has never been a majority government.

One of the most frustrating aspects of MMP is the impact on policy these confidence and supply agreements between parties have, which invariably involve either a watering down or beefing up of policy which the major party campaigned on and the adoption of other policies which were not the priority of the biggest party that was most popular with the voters. A smaller party can dream up a policy which seems very popular with the voters but is largely un-costed

because it seemed a good idea at the time the minor party put it up and they needed the traction in the polls such a policy would offer. It then becomes the job of the majority party to sell the policy it never owned and in some cases may have considered and rejected for good reason.

Of course one option would be to try and run the government without confidence and supply agreements at all, but that would be impossible and lead to anarchy within weeks if not days as those minor party leaders and those in Opposition did all they could to undermine the new government and bring it down by stifling its ability to supply money and make laws.

and certain sector groups in particular will pour scorn on any new policy which sees the light of day. Those who voted against the incoming government will say there is no principle in making such deals ignoring the fact that rejecting them would mean putting the country through another election. In this case the Opposi-

tion making these claims has also suffered its worst loss since 1919 and there is no suggestion that another election would show them in any better light.

The two represent different backgrounds, histories and experience which are not reflective of Labour Party membership. order includes changing bail laws to make it harder for those accused of the most serious offences to get bail. We'll also increase penalties for breaches of protection orders and change the way evidence is heard to better protect vulnerable court participants - especially children.

In education we will make secondary school performance information available to parents. We're starting a review of the Teachers Council to improve the quality of teaching. We're setting a target of 98 per cent early childhood education participation.

National's next steps in health include increasing the number of essential elective operations by at least 4,000 a year. We're shortening waiting times for specialist appointments, starting work on providing free after-hours GP visits for children under six, and ensuring that every state house built before 1978 that can be insulated is insulated.

We are committed to rebuilding Canterbury. We're providing certainty to locals by finishing the red zone classification process. We will also build a 17,000-seat temporary stadium at Addington, and use CERA's powers to continue to release land for residential subdivision ensuring there is an adequate supply of land to rebuild.

We have signed confidence and supply agreements with other parties in Parliament to help form a strong, stable, National-led Government for the coming three years. Together, we'll build a brighter future for all New Zealanders.

MEEGAN'S COLUMN The Body-Beauty Myth; Is Your Daughter in Danger?

She looks in the mirror and doesn't like what she sees, hates her body, compares herself negatively to girls and women she has seen on television, movies, music and magazines - and wonders whatA is wrong with her. Why doesn't she look like them? We are surrounded by un-

realistic, distorted images of beauty and the physical body. It is no wonder that more and more young people are struggling with body hatred, disordered eating, and an unhealthy focus on appearance.

We all know there is a problem with the way physical appearance and beauty is portrayed in the media. Current distorted beauty ideals are negatively influencing the way our daughters (and sons) value themselves and others. What can be done as a parent, care giver, aunt, uncle or friend to support a young person to develop and maintain healthy self-esteem around his or her physical appearance?

A mother, as a role model, has more influence on a daughter than what is directly said. A daughter will witness a mother's attitude, perception and engagement with women's magazines, celebrities, television shows, music videos and so on. Mothers need to be asked, "Are you able to embrace you own self-worth and inner beauty? Do you accept and embrace your own human being-ness; not criticise, complain and wish you looked differently."


How do the men in your

daughter's life perceive, treat, and talk about women? Does she hear them valuing women for their appearance, the perceived beauty of their body? The Kaitake Community Board met in Okato on December 5 in the Hempton Hall. The meeting was ably chaired by Doug Hislop. In attendance were most Board members including Teresa Goodin, Mike Pillette, and Keith Plummer (Alex Matheson forwarded an apology).

Also present were senior New Plymouth District Council officials, including Jayne Beer (Community Relations Officer), Julie Straka (Committee Adviser/ International Relations Co-ordinator), Aroha Chamberlain (Manager Iwi Relationships) and Stuart Robertson (Manager Parks Operations). Cr John 'Horse' McLeod was also present.

After the minutes of the last meeting (October 25) had been confirmed, the Members' Activity Report was accepted. This outlined Chairperson Doug Hislop's activities and he had certainly been very busy (almost 30 engagements). Examples included various official duties in meeting a delegation from Mishima sister city, the Xining Municipal Peoples Government Delegation.

A Community Emergency Response Planning Report was presented – prepared by Jayne Beer (Community Relations Officer). This was inspired to some degree by the Christchurch earthquakes and perceived shortfalls in response procedures. "I would like to congratulate Jayne on the huge amount of work she has done", commented Doug Hislop. Doug considered that at least 18 months to two years of consultation and planning would be needed to

finalise a viable Community Emergency Response Plan (CERP).

A Property (Land) Sales Report, prepared by Jeremy Wichman (Team Leader Asset Management) was presented. This summarises sales in the 2010-11 financial Year and progress towards approval and sale of other Council owned properties.

The report encompassed five categories; properties approved for sale by the Council, properties under consideration for sale with a final decision pending, properties with a low sale potential, properties sold in the 12 months to June 30 and properties to be retained after consideration.

A report of Urban Design was also presented. This had been prepared by Colin Comber (Manager Environmental Strategy and Policy). This report was in response to a submission by the NZ Institute of Architects Western branch to the 2011/12 Annual Plan.

The focus of the report is to reveal mechanisms to enhance dialogue between the Council and the community. Cr McLeod thought the

report timely considering the "concrete jungle" which has arisen in a "higgledy piggledy fashion".

It was resolved that the Council become a voluntary signatory to the NZ Urban Design protocol, and initiate steps to develop and adopt an Action Plan in accordance with the protocol. Finally, after consultation and study, it was decided to report back with recommendations with respect to the establishment of an Urban Design Panel Framework. It was also recommended that a councillor and Community

Board member serve as Urban Design Champions.

As changes have been proposed to the Local Electoral Act (2001), a report was prepared by Barry Rollo (Electoral Officer) which suggested a submission be prepared supporting the amendments, especially the ones relating to representation arrangements.

The NPDC Disability Strategy report was prepared by Craig Campbell-Smart (Community Development Adviser). The report highlighted successes and proposed some changes.


It was resolved that the report be endorsed, including changes to the Strategy Action Plan and Performance indicators.

Cain Aldridge's thriving Oakura business is turning many heads in the surfing world. No less a figure than Maz Quinn - New Zealand's number 1 surfer - is now ordering surfboards from CSA Surfboards. "He phoned me just a month ago. I was quite stoked", admits Cain. He adds, "He tried one a while ago and it was his favourite board".

CSA stands for Custom Surfboards Aotearoa and also for the initials in

Cain's name. Cain is the Shaper and Director of CSA Surfboards, which is now one of the largest surfboard manufacturers in New Zealand.

Cain admits he's kept busy these days. "The business is quite fast growing. This year was my best year ever. I've made more surfboards than ever before - over 500", he says.

"Custom-made surfboards are our main focus. By being custom-made our clients get

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

exactly what they need. They are sized up and they get the right board". These can be purchased (starting at \$780) and are ready to be uplifted just three weeks after the order is placed.

Cain made it clear that he was less keen on the imported boards, which are not attuned to each client's height, weight and skill level. However, he does stock some surfboards, which are not custom-made.

Cain has come a long way since our newspaper published its first story on his endeavours (June 23, 1999). Back then he was just 15, still at Opunake High School, and operating from his family's Opunake garage. The article has pride of place - framed and on the wall of his Oakura premises. These days Cain employs three people one full time and two part timers. His wife Bianca does a lot of the paperwork, such as GST returns. "She's a good people's person", he comments.

Hard at work applying a filler coat was one of the staff Keith Robinson. "Beautiful nice and smelly", he grins as he looks up briefly from his work. He has been with CSA for six years.

Recently, Cain invested in some state-of-the-art cad design technology - a CNC (Computer Numerically Controlled) machine. Evidently, this machine is one of only three in NZ and the only one in Taranaki. This involves a computercontrolled machine, which ensures that each custommade surfboard can be very finely tuned to perfection. "It's the latest thing in surfboard design". He adds, "All the best surfboard shapers in the world use them".

Apart from brand new custom-made surfboards, Cain also sells second hand boards. These are competitively priced from \$170 up to about \$500. "They are good for young kids - gets them in the water cheaply".

The firm also repairs surfboards - the quality repair job guaranteed. However, Cain does stock UV resin "for people who want to fix their own board".

There is a comprehensive range of accessories on display, such as leg ropes, wax, fins, board bags, tail pads and clothing. The shop even serves a mean cup of Ozone coffee.

There is no doubt that Cain's work is a labour of love. He works hard, but surfing is his favourite activity. "This week I've surfed every day", he admits with a smile.

However, he is involved at all levels of surfing, such as writing articles for trade magazines such as

The Double Rainbow: A book review

The Double Rainbow; James K Baxter, Ngati Hau and the Jerusalem Commune by John Newton (2009).

This book is published by Victoria University Press, Victoria University of Wellington, PO Box 600 Wellington. Benny's Books of New Plymouth were able to source this book. The title 'Double Rainbow' comes directly from Baxter's writing.

"Very well written", was the comment of former Jerusalem Commune member Ray Cleaver – perhaps better known as, until recently, Editor of the Stratford Press.

All people interested in New Zealand literature and bi-culturalism will find this carefully researched book fascinating. It goes well beyond Baxter's time at Jerusalem, and also mentions other communes in New Zealand associated with Baxter, as well as the communes which were offshoots after Baxter's untimely death in October, 1972, aged just 46.

Baxter remains highly regarded by the hapu he was adopted - Ngati Hau, according to one member Michael 'Mush' Bell, who now lives in the so-called 'Top House' - the main commune dwelling in Jerusalem. The hapu gave permission for their adopted member – whom they called 'Hemi' – to be buried in the small graveyard just behind epistle in St Josephs'. This 'Top House'.

When I visited Jerusalem in October of this year, Mush kindly showed me through what is now his home and told me about the book, which is being reviewed here. One surprise was learning that the commune continued in Jerusalem for about three years after Baxter's death - I had thought it had ended with him. John Newton examines why the commune finally ended - it had to do with the gradual influx of the wrong sort of people, some associated with gangs fuelled by too much alcohol and even

some violence. The book also mentions some interesting identities who were senior members of the commune, including the late Milton Hohaia of Parihaka, who was effectively deputy leader after Baxter's death. The departure of such major figures as Milton was another factor in the final conclusion of the commune.

Important members of the Maori community in Jerusalem are also outlined, such as Father Te Awhitu, farmer Toro Poutini and Wehe Wallace who had a major positive impact on the commune. These three people are repeatedly mentioned in Baxter's writing (poetry and prose) - always in a positive light.

Accompanying the text are some intriguing photographs, some by outstanding photographer Ans Westra, such as 'Baxter reading the

was the beautiful Catholic Church, which Baxter, a devout convert, would wander down barefooted to in the early hours – about 2am - to pray in solitude in front of the alter.

Baxter's relationship with the nearby pa is examined, as well as his relationship with the nuns at the convent, which was started in the 1880s by Mother Suzanne Aubert. The relationship with both was quite good, but not without incident and misunderstandings.

The commune – Baxter preferred the term 'community' – did not have a long life, from September 1969 to about 1975, but did considerable good helping young people with drug and alcohol problems, homeless youth and even some with psychiatric issues. No less a person than eminent psychiatrist Dr Fraser McDonald was effusive in his praise of the positive gains some of his patients had when he sent them to Jerusalem as a kind of 'halfway house', following hospitalisation in institutions as Kingseat and Carrington.

Ray Cleaver commented about the year (1971) he and his wife Jenny were commune members - "Extraordinary time and an extraordinary place", that what struck him was the diversity of people, ranging from 10-25 members, and "all

living in harmony". When Baxter's body was returned to Jerusalem for the service and burial Ray said, "It was very very moving. "I've never seen so much grief before or since". In the book is a photo of Ray carrying the coffin, with Greg Whakataka and other pallbearers.

There is a photograph of Baxter's granddaughter Stephanie and her grandmother Jacqueline (his ex-wife) on the day of the unveiling in October 1973. The little girl did the unveiling in a ceremony conducted by Father Te Awhitu.

Overall, I thoroughly recommend the reading of this excellent account of an important episode in New Zealand's social and literary history, complemented by its bi-cultural background.

Ian's contributions have continued as in addition to the walls Ian has built three stone bench seats and ten rubbish bins for the convenience of the Opunake community and visitors that adorn Tasman Street. The plaque honouring his contributions can be viewed outside the Opunake Library so next time you pass by stop and take a look and consider the enormous effort Ian has put in and his gift to our community.

'Coastal Care' new Health Facility proposed for Opunake / Coastal Area

Coastal Taranaki Health Trust announced in August in the Opunake and Coastal News that it had entered into an agreement in principle with the Cottage Rest Home to use part of its land for a new purpose built facility.

This facility is now moving closer from a dream to a reality. The name "Coastal Care" has been coined for the facility name and the Coastal Taranaki Health Trust, a committee set up to coordinate this new medical facility. The Trust claims it is continuing to consult with

existing service providers, and exploring further potential users, to ensure the facility will be practical, functional and as 'future proof' as possible. From their extensive consultation they feel that they now have a good idea of the requirements of the building that is needed and thus the plans are being firmed up.

The concept chosen is described as a win-win for both groups; the Cottage Rest Home will have both an additional income plus a medical and health service



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centre next door and the new Health Centre will have the space for future expansion if required without spending community money on land. Other advantages include room for the Ambulance Service and safe parking for both users and staff. The site allows a wider range of clinical plus other health related services to be centralised on one site, this meeting the approval of several of the government agencies that the Trust has spoken to. It also is claimed to provide a better level of privacy for those with appointments at the centre. Although we are aware that the centre will not be on the 'main street' we believe the savings, by not buying main street land, will mean more funds will available for a better facility as there will be no extra costs for the purchase and development of a main street section.

A disadvantage mentioned by some is that the Rest Home site is too far removed from the town centre for pedestrian users. Our investigation of the present users of the current medical centre show that 95% currently travel to the centre by car, very few currently walk. For those without vehicles, there is an Opunake volunteer transport service which hopefully will have less pressure in future to travel to New Plymouth for specialist appointments

as we hope to have more services available at the new facility.

Another suggestion for an alternative site was recently Continued page 23

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

A similar occurrence has happened in New Plymouth, and the quick thinking of Tonya Callebaut led to the launch of Logajob. Although South African by birth, Tonya, a former stockbroker had a burst of kiwi ingenuity during her first renovation experience in New Zealand.

Juggling the demands of a young family while having to scour the Yellow Pages to look for tradesmen to quote on her own renovations became a massive undertaking in itself. Invariably tradesmen would arrive as the baby was being put to bed, or not turn up at all. Without any word of mouth referrals to rely on, every step in the renovating process was frustrating and time-consuming.

Tonya realised chances were that people all over the

country were probably having similar issues in terms of finding tradesmen to quote. Said Tonya "I needed a way to get these 'tradies' to quote on the jobs I desperately needed done without having to come to my door". Logajob, an interactive online quoting system was born.

put forward, the old Railway land to the north of Tasman Street. This has since been researched with the District Council. The advice that the Trust has received is that there is no certainty that the Trust could obtain ownership because of its current status as Recreation Reserve. A Licence to Occupy such as the Sandford's Event Centre currently has is also unlikely as the facility purpose is not sport and recreation. A further complication is that this site, as an ex-Railway property is subject to the Public Works Act and an offer back to past owners must also be applied in any disposal process for this piece of land. To make any changes around ownership or leasing of this site would require a lengthy process with no guarantee of a positive outcome for the Trust.

The Trust will have an official function to launch a fundraising campaign

towards the end of February with a meal and an interesting keynote speaker. In the meantime lists of residents living in our contributing district have been drawn up and plans for how to canvas these have been made. This has been discussed with both individuals and organisations that may be able to assist with this big task. Brochures describing the proposal in more detail will be distributed widely to keep everyone informed. We have a support group assisting the Trust with tasks such as publicity, grant applications and financial advice. The Trust will also be approaching key stakeholder and corporates and arranging consultation and visits to our five local marae.

Based on our investigations into other community health centres, we are confident that what is being proposed is something that most people will want to support for both their family and their own personal health needs.

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

ing, freedom and motorcycles in our district. The title was inspired by the 1969 film Easy Rider which tells the story of two bikers played by Peter Fonda and Dennis Hopper, travelling through the American West and South.

Motorcycles embody freedom. They encapsulate the image of stretching limits, breaking boundaries, forward thinking and youthful rebelliousness – all qualities that are reflected in the spirit of South Taranaki.

Motorcycles were a feature of life in South Taranaki from the early years of the twentieth century. Their popularity and availability was much increased after World War II. The versatility and myriad uses of motorcycles and scooters on the farm and in the town ensured a supportive public for races and other events.

The Patea TT races were held at Whenuakura from 1948 to 1955. Although they drew crowds of up to three thousand, the spectator numbers caused the organisers, the Wanganui Motorcycle Sports Club, to decide not to hold any further meetings. Local identities such as Curly Mickleson, 1954, and Rod Coleman, 1955, were popular winners.

The Easy Riders exhibition will feature motorcycles and bicycles, as well as memorabilia related to their history in the district. Most of the objects are from the collection. It will tell a uniquely South Taranaki story that has universal appeal, particularly to those with an interest in motor sport and things mechanical.

During the exhibition younger visitors will have a chance to piece together a large wall puzzle to identify a local motorcycle hero. There will be also be drawings available to colour in. The exhibition runs




