Correction: Misleading headline


In the December 13 issue of the Opunake and Coastal News on page 11, the headline 'Patea and Waverley opt for fluoride'


On this month in history

On December 3, 1910 Freda Du Faur became the first woman to reach the summit of Mount Cook (Aoraki). Accompanying her were two guides Peter and Alex Graham, but she reached the top ahead of the two men. She said, "I gained the summit and waited for them, feeling very little, very lonely and much inclined to cry. They caught my hands and shook them, their eyes glowing with pleasure and pride and, with an effort, I swallowed the lump in my throat and laughed instead. The trio had also beaten the record by two hours. Mt Cook has three peaks the highest is 3,753 metres high, but on December 1991 10.5 metres was lost off the top.

Coastal Care right on track

The Coastal Taranaki Health Trust held its AGM on 17 December and the Chairman, Dan Holmes, provided a comprehensive report on the progress the group had made in the previous twelve months. He was also delighted to announce that Paul Bourke, from Pihama, and Julie Morgan, from Rahotu had agreed to join the Trust. Members of the public were able to study and ask questions about information displayed on the walls. This included the most up to date concept plans, the operational budget and a four week schedule depicting the very high occupancy rate for Coastal Care, the new hub for social and health services.

The Trust had recently invited representatives from 18 organisations, who will provide these services, to attend a workshop held in



Opunake. The 25 people who came along were given the opportunity to have input into the building plans. They were able to describe their needs and make suggestions for practical changes to make the new building functional and flexible enough to adapt to future demands. The Trust's architect, Jenny Goddard, was able to capture their ideas and ask relevant questions. She will now work on producing the final working plans and have these available by the end of February.

"The meeting was very exciting. It was quite an achievement to have so many professional people from different medical and social services in the same room and able to commit their time and expertise in such a collaborative way. Our whole community via Coastal Care will benefit because the people who will be working in the building were able to talk and listen to each other to see how they can cooperate to get the best outcomes for the community" said Coastal Care treasurer, Steve Corkill, "We are thrilled that such a comprehensive and wide range of services will be offered here on the Coast. It is hugely important that our community see this as a "their" place, where they can access not only help for health problems but

Quitline working well

Good news for smokers this New Year; Research shows Quitline clients are staying smokefree

Smokers who choose to stop smoking in the New Year are more likely to keep their resolution for the long-term if they choose to quit with Quitline, new research has shown.

The independent research shows that Quitline is helping people stay smokefree and people who are smokefree at six months are more likely to still be Smokefree at twelve months.

The research also found that one year after signing up with Quitline; over 20.9% of people were successfully smokefree. This compares to a quit rate of 13% in 2003, suggesting that Quitline is being much more effective for its clients.

One reason for this change is that Quitline offers a wide range of services, including online, blogs, phone and text. "The more Quitline services a client uses, the higher their rate of success. Smokers can pick and choose from our support services that work best for them to help them quit and stay quit" says Quitline Chief Executive Paula

Snowden. Research confirms that clients who used multiple services together had a quit rate of 29.5% at 12 months.

Quitline supports strong controls on the supply of tobacco to help smokers to quit and stay quit.

"Smoking is highly addictive and is a notoriously difficult habit to kick, so it makes sense that people should get as much help as they can to quit" says Paula Snowden.

People can get support through Quitline by talking to advisors on the phone, blogging about their journey on the Quitline website www.quit.org.nz getting supportive text messages, and accessing subsidised nicotine replacement therapy.

"In 2013, we will see increased collaboration with others in the health and smoking cessation sectors, particularly those working with Māori and Pacific communities and whānau. We all have an essential role to play in turning the goal of a Smokefree Aotearoa 2025 into a reality" says Paula Snowden.

The research was conducted by Gravitas Research and Strategy Limited (Nov).2


So the next time Frank was in Opunake he and Martha got together Opunake Beach Kiwi Holiday Park and designed a new trolley.


Inland Revenue provides a range of online services and toll free telephone numbers for borrowers in Australia and the United Kingdom, as well as online payment options for one-off or regular recurring payments.

"Éven those who are going to be out of the country for less than six months should talk with us first. They can nominate a person to keep an eye on their account and even make transactions on their behalf.

Fluoridation decision goes against majority view of residents

The STDC's recent decision to approve the addition of hydrofluorosilicic acid to the Patea and Waverley community water supplies, despite overwhelming opposition from residents, is outrageous and unacceptable.

Out of the 508 submissions received, 208 were from Patea residents and 40 from Waverley residents. Of those, 85% and 75% respectively were opposed. A further 113 were received from Hawera residents of whom all but one said they not only objected to the Council spending their rates, but also wanted fluoridation stopped in Hawera. The remaining 147 were from outside of South Taranaki and made up the bulk of the pro-fluoridation submissions.

208 submissions from a town the size of Patea is a huge turnout. At the Council Hearing not one resident spoke in favour, but South Taranaki dentists and the one GP (none of them Patea or Waverley residents), told the council that fluoride needed to be swallowed to be effective in reducing dental decay. However, they were contradicted by the dentist from the Ministry of Health's National Fluoridation Information Service who explained that fluoride is now known to work topically i.e. by being applied to the teeth.

The Centres for Disease Control (CDC) decreed in 2001 that the amount of fluoride in the dental enamel does not correlate with dental decay and that the primary benefit of fluoride is post-eruptive and topical. This means a person has to have teeth (therefore not be a baby) and it has to be applied to the teeth. The CDC is the top fluoridation promoter in the world. They admit that their theory of 50 years as to why fluoride should be added to water was flawed. However, instead of this resulting in the immediate cessation of fluoridation they came up with a new theory that because drinking fluoridated water raises the fluoride saliva levels from 0.006 ppm to 0.016 ppm that

this small amount will provide a topical benefit. I think if you swallow that then you will swallow anything.

But what is more concerning is that the local dentists did not even know this and that the councillors chose to ignore the wealth of scientific and medical evidence that fluoride causes harm provided by two dentists, a practising A&E doctor and a multitude of residents and others who quoted studies and even the opinion of Nobel prize winners.

Fluoride Free South Taranaki group has sent the Councillors some questions two of which are:

1. What dosage mg/ kg/day are bottle fed babies in Hawera currently receiving?

2. The National Research Council determined that effects on the thyroid were associated at 0.05-0.13 mg/kg/day when iodine was adequate and a lower level when iodine was inadequate. Using Plunket averages bottle fed babies in Hawera are exceeding that dose. Why do you think it is justifiable, in light of the council's statutory responsibility to protect residents from external public health threats, to give babies in Hawera (and soon Patea and Waverley) a dosage of fluoride that the top science in the world has found to affect thyroid?

Add to that the instructions on a fluoride pill bottle "Do not give to pregnant women or children under three". Anyone with an ounce of intelligence must question why giving fluoride via the water supply would suddenly make it safe for babies.

Adding a highly toxic chemical, or even any chemical, to people's drinking water, is serious business and the people of South Taranaki deserve their councillors to do serious research. Hiding behind endorsements from USA influenced institutions (the USA being the most unhealthy country in the western world) is nothing more than PR and people should

be wondering what is the real reason. Would the fact that the MoH has provided a grant of \$360,000 toward the upgrade of the Patea water supply have anything to do with it?

Patea residents are outraged that the STDC would choose

to ignore democracy, science, common sense and common decency and are vowing to fight back.

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

vear it was. If you're a farmer, teacher, retailer or household manager reflection on the year

will be different. In politics, I think the year has been defined by the ease with which we are distracted from the big issues by the small.

The events surrounding Kim Dotcom were entertaining as we learned of an unimaginably wealthy man, of lavish election donations, helicopter trips to a palatial residence, of deals to conceal the origins of donations and a heck of a lot of forgetfulness.

But the issue was less one of political betrayal by those to whom the ample Mr Dotcom was so generous and more one of the threat to our sovereignty as we discovered that the police and national security agencies here bent over backwards to please their American counterparts. On unemployment, which is the highest it's been for 15 years, we saw small measures to take care of some teenagers on a benefit, but

nothing else. In desperation, the government is now left to legislate for lower wages for young people in the hope employers will take them on rather than older workers who expect to be paid more.

The big issue of fixing growing unemployment through government procurement and other government measures hasn't had a look-in.

On the issues at ACC we were mesmerised by what happened to one claimant who had been treated badly and who found a way to use wrongly disclosed personal information to elevate her story to national news. But her case wasn't isolated, and the real problems still remain for hundreds of others. Christmas is a time we can reflect on these things but ultimately it is a time to retreat to the most important things in life: family and the people who sustain us every day; community; and the spaces and places around us that are a respite from the rigours of daily life.

It's a time for those of us who have the means and the spirit to reach out to those whose year has brought misfortune or set-back: the child who has lost a parent; the husband who has lost a wife; the family who have been thrown into hardship through loss of work or livelihood; those who, through birth or life's vicissitudes are less fortunate.

This is the season for goodwill to all in our community, to do those things that make a community. Celebrating together, whether in worship or fellowship. Giving hope as we enter a new year.

Rutherford Foundation Scholarships awarded

Nine emerging researchers receive prestigious Rutherford Foundation scholarships

The Rutherford Foundation Trust has awarded prestigious scholarships to nine of New Zealand's most outstanding emerging researchers, including four international PhD scholarships and five postdoctoral fellowships.

Highlights from the 2012 funding round include a range of projects, from the treatment of osteoporosis and cardiac dysfunction in diabetes, to the future of resource management in New Zealand and black holes in astrophysics.

The Rutherford Foundation, which awards the scholarships, is a trust set up by the Royal Society of New Zealand to provide support to emerging New Zealand scientists.

Chair of the Trustees of the Rutherford Foundation, Professor Margaret Brimble, says it is important for our emerging researchers to gain these types of scholarships. She highlights the need for these opportunities:

"The shortage of postdoctoral positions in New Zealand is a concern for the research community. The Rutherford Foundation is therefore very pleased to offer five postdoctoral fellowships to talented PhD graduates as well as four PhD training scholarships."

"The calibre of these young scientists was truly outstanding and the competition was extremely tough. These scientists were all undertaking research in areas of national importance."

The five postdoctoral fellows will work at New Zealand universities and crown research institutes. Two of the PhD scholar

Don't be let down by your car this summer

Everyone wants to enjoy the summer, so the one thing you don't want is a vehicle that breaks down, or worse still, suffers a mechanical failure that might put you, your passengers or even other road users at risk.

While modern cars are usually exceptionally reliable, they won't stay that way on their own. As with any piece of equipment or machinery, maintain and care for your vehicle and it will generally return the favour. And, like any mechanical device, it's most likely to fail when it's highly stressed. The Motor Trade Association (MTA) says there are lots of things owners can do to reduce the chances of being let down by your car this summer.

Vehicle failure or problems often come when a vehicle is under stress. In summer that usually revolves around heat – either as a result of high ambient temperatures, a heavily loaded vehicle or stop-start driving when stuck in a queue. Not surprisingly, summer often sees some motorists caught up in all three at the same time.

If there is a minor problem with your vehicle, there's a much higher probability that it will develop into something more major when the temperature rises. A car engine usually operates at around 95°C, depending on the make and model of course. When that same vehicle is loaded with people and camping gear, is caught in a long line of stop-start traffic, and is crawling its way up a steep hill in 30°C plus heat – if problems are going to occur, it will often be at a time like this.

So, when you head out for your few days away this summer, make sure that your vehicle is fully prepared for those warmer temperatures. Some simple steps can help save you time, money and headaches during your trip:

• Consider a pre-trip inspection by an MTA technician; repairs can be more costly on the road. Ask them to check things like the air conditioning, cooling system, drive belts, hoses and clamps, brakes, along with the fundamentals like fluids, oil and water.

• High temperatures can be hard on your battery – get it checked to ensure it will last the distance.

• Check the condition and air pressure in all tyres, including the spare, to make sure they are roadworthy. Remember, heat is a tyre's biggest enemy.

• Replace ragged wiper blades, and make sure the wash reservoir tank is full and you've added proper cleaning agents – not dishwashing liquid.

• Check all your lights are working. In the summer you may not use your lights very much, so that blown bulb can go unnoticed – until you need it.

• Make sure your sun visors are doing the job; glare from the sun, either directly or from other vehicles, can blind you temporarily.

• Be aware that you might need access to your spare at the most inconvenient time – so if you need to get to it, plan the stowage of luggage and gear to minimise any problems – and remember, it might not always be dry when you are trying to change your tyre.

• If you are towing, ensure your towbar and braking capability is up to the load you are hauling. Because of the strain towing can place on your car, it's vital your cooling and lubrication systems are in top condition.

It's also a good idea to have an emergency kit in your car, just in case you need it. It should include: • Jumper cables

- a jack and wheel-brace
- A torch

• water for both the radiator and yourself (around two litres)

blanket and towel

• emergency reflectors. Summer is often the time people choose to try roads that are off the beaten track. By all means, enjoy the journey and take time to appreciate New Zealand's

scenery. Keep in mind though, that if you are trying to avoid those queues of fellow holidaymakers, the scenic route may not be the quickest, and if you do strike a problem, there may not be too many passers-by and your cell phone may not work - so plan your trip accordingly. Heat and long days can lead to some drivers being on the road for longer than they should. Here are some tips to help avoid becoming drowsy while driving.

• Take breaks every two hours and if you feel tired, have difficulty focusing or just want to stretch your legs – pull over and have a walk around.

• If you can, share the driving with someone. Passengers can help look out for early warning signs of fatigue.

• Take a 15-to-20-minute nap. More than this can make you groggy for at least five minutes after awakening.

• Consume the equivalent of two cups of coffee (e.g. soft drinks, energy drinks, coffee, tea) but caffeine takes about 30 minutes to enter the bloodstream and will not greatly affect those who regularly consume it. And remember, stimulants are just that, they are not a substitute for proper rest.

• Don't drive if you're sleep deprived. Less than six hours sleep can triple your risk of driver fatigue.

• Don't drive when you would normally be asleep – avoid driving through the night.

During the summer break, everyone wants to take advantage of the great weather. This means the roads are busier than ever so drivers need to be even more aware of the risks. By driving to the conditions, planning your journey and having patience with other road users, everyone can stay safe on the roads this summer.

Sir Henry said global demand for dairy was the strongest it had ever been and was growing.

"We need to use all of our muscle to push ahead and stay ahead. But we will do it our way. History has shown we are not afraid

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

Most, at least to some degree, recognise that all aquatic environments present potential hazards, yet they are often unsure of what precautionary measures can be taken to make their enjoyment of these playgrounds as safe as possible.

Always remember SAFE-TY, when enjoying the water, must be the first priority. It's a parent's responsibility to keep their kids safe in and around the water. Supervision without any distractions is the single most important precaution you can take. Proper supervision in and around water means a responsible adult keeping young children in their care both WITHIN SIGHT and WITHIN REACH. If you haven't already, start your child's water safety education, teach them simple rules about what's acceptable when enjoying the water, like always being with an adult and swimming between the flags at the beach.

Enjoying the beach should be both safe and fun, especially if you follow a few basic safety tips.

Swim Between the Flags and listen to the advice of lifeguards. On patrolled beaches surf lifeguards put up yellow and red flags on beaches where they are patrolling. The area between the flags is constantly monitored and is the safest place to swim at the beach. For those that love their fishing and diving don't let the rush to enjoy these activities lead to tragedy.

Skippers you are responsible for the safety of all on board. Manage the risk by always taking and wearing life jackets, checking the marine weather forecast, ensure you have at least 2 reliable means of communication and leave the alcohol back on shore to be enjoyed later along with those 'the one that got away' stories. Divers, please DiveSafe this summer, never dive alone and plan your dive and dive your plan.

Clean camping

Rural communities are gearing up for the summer holidays and Rural Women NZ would like to remind campers of some simple steps to keep our countryside clean and green, just as we like to promote it.

Campers, especially those without onboard toilet facilities, should camp in designated areas such as holiday parks and Department of Conservation camping grounds to avoid problems seen in past years of unwanted 'leftovers'.

"For the past few years we have been highlighting the problem of campers without onboard toilet facilities fouling our rural roadsides and the emptying of effluent and grey water down cattle stops and roadside drains," says Liz Evans, Rural Women New Zealand national president.

"We have seen some improvement since the Freedom Camping Act was passed in 2011 and need to keep this up."

The www.camping.org.nz website provides a 'one stop shop' for campers. It includes information on keeping safe, facilities, regional camping, what to do and where to stay in New Zealand.

If people are wanting to 'freedom camp' they should assume nothing, and check with i-Site visitor centres or Department of Conservation offices to find out where they can freedom camp.





ers and Rifles, and Kupapa (Whanganui loyal Maori). It was a disaster for the colonial force. Fifty men were killed or wounded. This victory for Titokowaru forced the entire European

population of South Taranaki to abandon their homes and farms and head south to Patea and Whanganui. The 'Wellington Independent' newspaper described the battle as "....the most serious and complete defeat ever experienced by the colonial forces.. Fighting in the tangled heavy bush was always difficult,


but at Te Ngutu o te manu many of the soldiers were new recruits with little or no experience of advancing and finding cover in such conditions

Klezmer Rebs at Sugar Juice



Wellington's eight-piece klezmer band the Klezmer Rebs will perform at the Sugar Juice Cafe in Opunake on Saturday 12th January 2013 from 8pm, giving coasties a rare opportunity to hear unique klezmer folk, American jazz and swing music. Klezmer Rebs instrumentation includes guitar and mandolin, clarinet, violin, accordion, keyboards, trumpet, trombone, helicon (like a tuba), recorder and vocals.

Klezmer (composed of the Hebrew words kley and zemer meaning 'vessels of song' or more freely translated 'musical instrument') is an engaging style of world/ folk music born out of the Yiddish/Jewish culture of eastern Europe in the 1800s and 1900s. Klezmer musicians were the itinerant fringe dwellers in the Jewish shtetl or ghettos (made famous by the musical 'Fiddler on the Roof') who provided music, a centrepiece in every Jewish wedding and other

celebrations. The musicians were not highly regarded in the shtetl as they were often irreligious and secular, couldn't read or write music, and hung out with, drank and played with Gypsies. They often sang for their supper (and schnapps!) and were frequently paid by the song. Klezmer then went to America and in the early 1900s began to fuse with jazz and swing. There has been a worldwide revival of klezmer music since the 1980s. The Klezmer Rebs have

been playing together for 10 years now and have performed at festivals across New Zealand. Hearing the Klezmer Rebs live expect big band and vocal arrangements of genuine old klezmer tunes - from the lively genuine Yiddish wedding music (freylachs and bulgars) to the delicate slice of life stories from the east European shtetl .

The Rebs world music appeals to everyone. While most of songs are sung in Yiddish (that mostly-Germanic and very onomatopoeic language), they also perform

Now more than ever we consider our pets as family members, so when heading off on a summer holiday, they come too. But travelling with your furry friends can require a bit of forward planning to ensure the safety of everyone concerned.

The Motor Trade Association (MTA) has put together a few tips and suggestions with advice from Wellington SPCA, to make sure your summer road trip is as stress free as possible.

As you pack the kids and luggage into the car ready to head off on a holiday, most people seldom think twice about putting the pets in the back before motoring off. "It's just as important to consider the safety and needs of our pets on a long journey, as it is for our kids and other passengers", says MTA spokesperson Jayne Murray.

Here are a few simple steps you can take to make travelling with your furry friends a lot easier and safer this holi-

day season. • Secure your pets in a well ventilated crate, carrier, or harness. An unrestrained pet could be seriously injured, or injure other people in the car, if a crash were to occur. A dog sitting unsecured in the back seat can become a large furry missile, if the car stops suddenly in an accident. Unrestrained pets can also distract a driver and cause an accident if they get frightened or threatened by something. If involved in a crash, an unrestrained pet could escape and be hit by another vehicle, or cause another collision. And a frightened dog may attack strangers who are trying to help at the scene of an accident.

Wellington SPCA Chief Inspector Ritchie Dawson says: "As a pet owner you have an obligation under the Animal

Welfare Act to transport your animal in a safe and secure manner. Cats are best travelling in a cage, and dogs should be restrained in a safety harness or crate. If you're travelling in a ute with an open deck, it is the legal responsibility of the owner to ensure that any load is secured in a safe manner, under the Land Transport Act. The best way to secure a dog on an open ute is to tether them to the middle of the front of the deck, right behind the cabin in the centre so the dog can't lean out over the side. The tether needs to be long enough so they can sit and lay down comfortably, but short enough so it can't lean out over the edge of the deck. If you were to go around a corner too quickly, and the tether is too long, you could hang your dog if it fell off the deck", he says.

• Make sure your pet stays within the vehicle at all times You wouldn't let your kids hang out of the windows,

would you? Keeping your pet inside the vehicle not only keeps them safe from getting hurt by objects outside, but it also keeps passersby safe too. "If you've stopped to get petrol, or you're caught in line of slow holiday traffic and a pedestrian or cyclist passes, if your dog is able to stick their head out the window, they're not only going to give the person a fright, but might latch on. Then you're in all sorts of trouble," Ritchie Dawson says.

• Take your pets with you when you park

Never leave them unattended in a car for more than 10-15 minutes. If you're going to stop and have lunch, make sure someone can stay with your pet. Let another person get takeaways, or sandwiches, or have a picnic, rather than leave your pet in the car. "On a hot summer's day, the inside of a car heats up very

quickly. On a 30 degree day for example, the temperature

inside your car - even with the windows slightly opened or in the shade - will reach 39 degrees within 10 minutes. In 30 minutes it can climb up to 49 degrees, or even higher, and for any pet trapped inside it becomes like an oven. These conditions can easily mean death for the animal.

It's not an offence to leave your pet in the car, but if the animal suffers from any unnecessary pain or distress, you can be liable for criminal prosecution", says Dawson.

 "Be prepared: you may need to take a few stops on the way. You might not do the trip in one day - so find a motel or motor camp that allows pets. A lot of them do and it's just a matter of asking. If you've got a well-behaved dog it could sleep in the back of the car at night," says Dawson.

If you have any concerns about travelling with pets, consult your vet or local SPCA for advice.

The changes, introduced as part of the Government's Safer Journeys strategy to reduce deaths and injuries suffered by motorcyclists and keep new riders safer on our roads, include:

• Changes to minimum licence time requirements - all novice motorcyclists, regardless of their age, are now subject to a minimum of 18 months in the restricted licence stage. Important aspects of this change to note are:

- Taking an approved advanced driving course (Street Talk or Defensive Driving Course) no longer reduces the minimum time a person is required to hold their restricted motorcycle

licence. - The minimum time a person aged 25 years of age or older is required to hold their restricted licence has increased from 6 months to 18 months.


• The learner approved motorcycle scheme - the introduction of a powerto-weight restriction for learner and restricted motorcyclists. The scheme identifies a range of appropriate motorcycles for learner and restricted Class 6 licence holders, based on the overall performance capability of the motorcycle. Learner and restricted motorcycle riders now have a wider range of motorcycles to choose from but need to ensure the motorcycle they are riding meets the new criteria. • Strengthening the basic handling skills test - the test has been changed to ensure new riders have a higher level of skills required to ride on our roads before they obtain their learner licenc

In addition to these initiatives, the NZ Transport Agency expects to introduce a competency based training and assessment course in late 2013 as an alternative path through the motorcycle licensing stages.

Robert Falcon Scott left Port Chalmers. New Zealand in his ship 'Discovery' on his first voyage to Antarctica. Once esconced on the conti-

nent Commander (later Captain) Scott, Dr Edward Wilson and Ernest Shackleton attempted to reach the South Pole. They didn't make it, but did set the record for the closest anyone had been to the South Pole.

Shackleton got back to the hut in bad shape health-wise and was invalided back to Great Britain against his wishes. He never forgave Scott.

In years to come Ernest Shackleton (later Sir) led expeditions back to the Antarctic region, the first one in 1907 and he is remembered as a great explorer in his own right. He was Sir Edmund's Hillary's favourite explorer.







The Police have powers of search, seizure and arrest if you are found to be committing an offence under this bylaw; refuse to leave the area or refuse to surrender the liquor when requested.

A person convicted of an offence against this bylaw could be fined up to \$20,000.00



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

Plan what you're going to eat, says Sharron.

She herself preferred wholegrain foods such as wholegrain pasta and rice which she said were higher in protein and in fibre than the more refined starchy foods.

She also recommended keeping really busy, get outside, keep active she urged.

Other advice included drinking lots of water, cooking in extra virgin olive oil and supplementing your diet with protein shakes. "Two shakes a day will help you lose weight.'

She also encouraged people to not think in terms of weight loss "think about bolstering your nealth and changing your lifestyle. Choose a diet rich in antioxidants she advised suggesting taking multivitamins "made from herbs" which she sells.

Green tea takes away some of your cravings she said. "If you like chocolate, eat the darker chocolate".

Socialising was important for overall health she said but suggested avoiding alcohol. Taking aloe vera three times a day with your meal was another suggestion along with some tablets she sells which she takes before a meal.

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Prestigious scholarships offer valuable financial support to Maori students

Guardian Trust and the Māori Education Trust are calling for eligible Māori students to submit their applications for an education boost. After distributing \$130,000 earlier this year to 120 Māori secondary, undergraduate and postgraduate student recipients, the two organisations are inviting applications for the 2013 round of distributions from the Rose Hellaby Māori Education Fund.

Applications for the 2013 scholarships opened on 30

November 2012. Secondary applications close on 28 February 2013 and tertiary applications on 29 March 2013. The postgraduate scholarships specifically support outstanding Māori students undertaking Masters, PhD or other postgraduate study in the fields of engineering, mathematics, science, technology or medicine, but with a particular bias toward those eager to provide leadership to Māori in their given field and benefit Māori generally. Also eligible for schol-

arships from the fund are Māori undergraduates studying in the scientific, mathematical or technical fields, and Year 9 Māori who demonstrate financial need and academic ability and aptitude to purchase school uniforms or textbooks. More information and an application form can be found at www.maorieducation.org.nz via the Apply for Scholarships page. Since the Fund was created in 1969, Guardian Trust has acted as sole trustee, administrator and investment

manager, distributing \$3.2 million through the Māori Education Trust to nearly 5,000 Māori students - \$1.1 million in the past decade alone.

Guardian Trust and the Māori Education Trust formally created the Rose Hellaby Postgraduate Māori Scholarships in 2010. Rose Hellaby, a descendant of the Auckland-based meat dynasty, established her eponymous Māori Education Fund with the goal of creating educational opportunity for Māori children and young adults.

Philip Morgan Rees, Guardian Trust's General Manager Personal Client Services, says of the fund, "Guardian Trust is delighted to be supporting the wishes of Rose Hellaby through the annual distributions made possible by her foresight and generosity. On December 20, 1990 the New Zealand Sports Hall of Fame was launched with 75 inaugural inductees. The chairperson of the steering committee was Sir Ron Scott, who said, "that those inducted had to be those sporting greats recognised as making a lasting contibution to New Zealand's sporting history.

History revisited by descendants of pioneering family

Descendants of William Pettigrew gathered recently in Auckland to celebrate the 150th anniversary of his arrival in New Zealand from Pollockshields, Glasgow in 1862. A bus tour was conducted along the route he took from Auckland to Komokoroki during which they drove past the actual house they lived in Parnell for a few years before they came to Opunake. Sixty descendants attended from all over the North Island - from Wellington, Gisborne and Taranaki.

William and his brother James left Scotland looking for work. As they had paid their own passage they were allotted 40 acres of land in Komokoroki -about 35 kms southwest of Warkworth. Story has it they walked over hills, through swamp and dense bush, carrying 80 lb packs on their backs to get to the allotted land. The land was rough and swampy to farm however and times were hard. After waiting for some years for the government to build the roads, William was instrumental in setting up the local roads board and opening up the area with new roading and bridges. Life was tough though and after a few years, when he found he couldn't make a living, James returned to Scotland leaving his share of the land

to William. William married Susan Laybourn - another immigrant, whose family lived across the road - in 1871. As Auckland slipped into recession the couple decided to come to Opunake in 1882 with their six children - three more more were to subsequently be born in Opunake. William built the family house on the corner of Whitcombe and Ponderosa

Place, using boulders from the beach and limestone. The house with walls twelve inches thick was apparently patterned on the Pettigrew's family home in Scotland. It was intended that a second story be added but this was never done by the Pettigrews. A second story was added by a later owner Ian Stevenson in the 1980s.

The decision to come to Opunake was made due to advice that this was 'the' place to be. There were many military personnel here that William could trade with which boded well with opening a store which they intended. How devastating it must have been however to discover that the military left on the very boat that Susan and the children had arrived on! Still William and Susan proceeded to set up one of the first general stores in Opunake – near where the saleyards were opposite where Corkill Systems now are, supplying everything from hardware to groceries. The building was eventually burnt down. They then built a shop further down town where Collins Sports Centre are now. The business was known as Pettigrew and Laybourne, William being joined by his brother in law. The business was later managed by William's daughter Agnes.

The family brought a cart with them from Auckland. For many years it was used to unload the surf boats and deliver the groceries and other goods around the district. There were lidded bins on the sides of the cart for flour and sugar. Two horses were used to pull the cart, one in the shafts and the other as leader as the roads were very muddy. From 1893 when the Jerseydale farm was purchased at Pihama the same cart was used for farm work, and later to take the milk to the factory. In latter years this cart was used to transport the bodies of the sailors from the wreck of the Lizzie Belle to the Oeo Hotel. The cart which lead the Pihama school centennial parade with four of William's great, great grandchildren riding in it is now in storage at Pihama.

William had a great knowledge of homeopathic treatments and for many years was the unofficial doctor/ chemist for the town. He was known as 'Dr Homeopathic' and continued in this role until the first chemist, Mr.

Feaver, arrived.

William played a leading part in gaining approval and funding for the wharf at Opunake. He firmly believed this facility was crucial to open up the area to promote trading. His previous experience with the roading issues at Komokoriki proved valuable. A wharf was finally built, but it was found to be unsuitable due to local tidal and weather conditions.

William quickly became a well respected community man and was a member of many committees, including the town board, land board, church, primary school and dairy factory. At various stages he was elected chairperson of them all. The local Methodist church

played a big part in the Continued on page 36
