Earthquake proofing Theatre

With plans to make Opunake's Everybody's Theatre a multifunctional facility available for concerts, dances and other functions Everybody's Theatre could become the focal point of the town believes Egmont Plains Community Board Chairperson Sharon Arlidge.

Stage one of the earthquake strengthening of Opunake's Everybody's Theatre is now nearing completion with reinforcing beams being added to the auditorium area of the historic theatre.

The beams were dropped in through the roof of the theatre by crane. The cost of this massive project, \$221,000, was funded by the Pub Chari-

Everybody's Theatre was "yellow stickered" by South Taranaki District Council engineers following the second big Christchurch earthquake.

Debbie Campbell who is chairperson of the Everybody's Theatre Trust said the second stage of the refurbishment which will follow will be "tidying it up and putting it back together".

The reinforcing of the auditorium has meant that the interior cladding had to be removed. The toilets are also going to be relocated. An architect has been employed to redraw plans for the interior refurbishment.

So next up they will be getting quotes for the fire rated wall linings, fire alarms and upgrading the electrical and lighting system. There are also plans to install a small kitchen. The toilet area which also required reinforcing beams are to also be altered and will be completely refurbished.

They are currently waiting to apply for funding from

the TSB Community Trust said Debbie. Adding that the second stage of the operation which will also include purchasing a new digital projector has been estimated to cost in the region of \$303,000. Explained Debbie the new projector is required because it is expected that by the end of 2013 all movies will be digital making the old projector obsolete.

The quaint Everybody's Theatre has been a picture theatre since 1921.

The premises were originally built as a general store in 1914.

In 1921 a local family, the O'Rorkes, bought the building and built on the auditorium at the back converting it to a picture theatre which it has been ever since.

In 1980 the community bought the theatre which was then privately owned by Bruce Whiting who had run it as a picture theatre for many years.

Everybody's Theatre has been run by volunteers ever since.

In March 2012 it was yellow stickered. The engineering report said it needed to be earthquake strengthened describing the structural safety of the building as "questionable" and no longer safe for the public.

It is only the auditorium area that's unsafe said Debbie - the part where everybody sits. "The front bit's OK".

The theatre shut its doors on March 9 2012.

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
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Mayor agrees fluoride dosage exceeds recommendations by US Research Council

I have had a response from Mayor Dunlop with regards to the dosage of fluoride that bottle fed babies are receiving. The mayor has agreed that the dosage exceeds what the National Research Council (top scientific body in the US) has determined is likely to affect the thyroid. His reasoning of why this is okay appears to be because local GP Dr Blayney says so. mayor has advised that I contact other organisations such as the Ministry of Health or the DHB since he really has no explanation of his own even though it is him and his fellow councillors, not the Ministry of Health or the DHB, that are responsible administering medication. It also interesting that the mayor is relying on local GP Dr Blayney when Dr Blayney could not medicate even one person without their informed consent, yet is encouraging the mayor and councillors to do this to thousands of people.

Parents have a right to what medications know their children are receiving. The fact that their bottle fed baby is being given a dosage of fluoride via the public water supply known to affect thyroid and not even being told, is outrageous and is also unacceptable.

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

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Earthquake-prone buildings – have your say depending on individual

The Government is consulting on major proposed changes to how we deal with earthquake-prone buildings in the wake of the Christchurch Earthquakes - Now is your chance to comment.

Currently, local councils make decisions on how Earthquake-Prone Buildings in their districts should

be dealt with, in consultation with their communities.

The Government has proposed replacing this with a consistent national approach. All non-residential and multi-unit, multi-storey residential buildings would have to have a seismic capacity assessment done within five years. Owners of buildings identified as earthquakeprone would then have up to 10 years to strengthen or demolish these buildings.

This means that all earthquake-prone buildings would be dealt with within a maximum of 15 years, compared with an average of 28 years under the current system,

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Helping grow the country

2013 will be a busy and also a controversial year for the Taranaki Regional Council. However before I begin to talk about that I want to look back to 2012 and acknowledge Anne Hickey who was awarded a QSM in the New Year honours. She had a great ability to cut through all the theory and pomposity and get to the heart of the matter. She never failed to speak up forcefully but politely about issues she thought important. She was meticulous with detail and knew that small matters overlooked can defeat major projects. Moreover she never thought she knew more than the public. Congratulations, Anne, you are an example for all of us.

In 2013 the Taranaki Regional

Council must review its Fresh Water Plan. This will be our second review and will no doubt attract a lot of headlines and comments. Some commentators are already loudly proclaiming how bad things are in our local rivers while others note how much improvement there has been. Once again TRC will hold hearings, receive submissions and get heated comments from vested interests. The end result will be a balance. Farmers who are already making major commitments to fencing and planting streams will be required to step up even further. The TRC is already taking a head line, prosecuting any major incident and applying instant fines if cows are found in waterways. Towns and communities too, have to clean up their handling of waste water and storm runoff procedures as exampled by the Eltham-Hawera piping of sewerage. However we should all note that rivers and streams are outside in the real environment and will always have wildlife such as ducks and pukeko, and that dust, dirt and vegetation will always get into them.

Another controversy which won't be going away is the Fracking debate where passionate opponents to the process will lock into battle with those who say there are absolutely no bad effects visible or invisible after many vears of the process.

As a councillor I am not only a public representative but I have also to act according to a quasi-judicial role in these matters. This means I should be listening carefully to all parties. I should not make decisions upon which side is the louder or which side has the best economic or short term argument but instead look to give the best balanced and fairest response available. Everybody has to respect that. If they lose a debate on some issues it is because their argument was not good enough, not because councillors or officials are corrupt or self interested. We may be wrong and we may not get the emphasis always right, but generally we strive to be fair and to give a balanced outcome. The public are perfectly entitled

never turn into attributing bad motives to those who disagree with you.

Another issue not yet clearly in view will be the Government's review of the Resource Management Act. It is true that this piece of legislation, the framework of our environment law, can result in a lot of cost, considerable bureaucracy, delay and confusion, but on the other hand it is also a vehicle to protect the public's rights and the environment. The trick is to do the latter and cut down on the former. Legislators in Wellington of course try to create the big picture and then leave the Regional Councils to fill in the blank spaces and work out how all this will hang together in practice.

Finally let me give a small plaudit to my fellow councillors. It is great to tackle knotty and complex issues in a good atmosphere with a co-operative give and take approach. We certainly don't always agree but our council functions well because everyone works together to achieve an outcome. I hope we can continue to do that in 2013.

Mary continues her spiritual journey

"I can remember having a strong sense of calling to lead a congregation at Opunake's Co-operating Parish," says Mary Nicholas. Already part of the lay ministry team, it was at a day Christian retreat in 1995 however that really set in motion her path.

They were singing a hymn. The lyrics go:

Here I am Lord

I have heard you calling in the night

Here I am Lord, is it you Lord

If you need me I will go.

"They really spoke to me," said Mary.

The next year she started theological studies.

Ordained on November 4 last year, Mary recently left Opunake, the town she and husband David moved to from Auckland 37 years ago, to take up the position of minister at a parish in Whangarei.

Her appointment is the culmination of a long and interesting spiritual journey.

Already a qualified teacher, Mary began by training as a state school chaplain. She went on to be chaplain of Marfell School in New Plymouth for 18 months. In 2000 she started a three year counselling training course run by the Bible College of New Zealand. She then became a school counsellor - combining the role with part time teaching - to "sharpen her pastoral care skills.

It was a valuable insight

into troubled teens. "A lot of teenagers issues come out of their uncertainty about who I am, where do I belong, where do I fit in. Generally they came from broken homes where there was the lack of a father who was crucial in forming identity. Often the family background lacked stability," said Mary. Ninety percent of the kids at high school in counselling were already having issues with drugs or alcohol which helped them with their stress. "My job was to try and encourage them to find other ways to deal with stress. She added when you could engage the parents there was more likely to be a positive outcome. From 2008-9, Mary was a school counsellor at

Coastal Taranaki School one day a week, a voluntary position.

In 2010 she enrolled as a full time student at Trinity Methodist Theological College in Auckland. Since completing her studies she was stationed in South Taranaki District at Hawera and Patea parishes and Patea Area School, again an unpaid position.

Mary's new placement by the Methodist Church - "You do get the chance to refuse" is at St Johns Parish in Kamo Road, Whangarei.

"It's a parish which is very forward looking and is active in a community action project," says Mary explaining there is a community house which has an alternative education programme for school days. They also look after the housing of people in the community. A community law office runs out of the parish complex.

The parish has provided a house, which they have now settled into. Son Peter accompanied them to help with the unpacking.

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Glenn Inquiry seeking input for child abuse and domestic violence project

The Glenn Inquiry continues its ability to attract an impressive line up of experts to work on the inquiry, having announced that 23 New Zealanders from around the country will join the international members selected on its 'Think Tank'.

Director of the Glenn Inquiry, Ruth Herbert, says the Think Tank, an informal networked group of 36 international and New Zealand members, will provide a critical role in the Inquiry.

"They individually and collectively provide extensive expertise that we can draw on throughout the inquiry process. There are names on the list that are well known in the fields of child abuse and domestic violence and there are some new names with outstanding credentials. I'm thrilled with who we have attracted and their passion to get involved and to making a difference."

Similarly to the 13 international experts Herbert says they bring with them an impressive breadth and depth of expertise.

"I'm thrilled to have a mixture of academics and front line people from a GP to a social worker to community workers to those in advocacy roles. Sir Owen Glenn has always been insistent that this would be the People's Inquiry and the make-up of our Think Tank will ensure that."

Sir Owen Glenn says it has been this ground swell of support that has encouraged him that they are on the right

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Tasman St, Opunake Ph (06) 761-8502 track. "This is not a traditional inquiry; it is very much about the people. It's about the people who have been affected, who work in this area and see it every day, about the views of interested parties. Consequently a panel won't be appointed until we have gone through this information gathering phase, which the Think Tank members will be heavily involved in."

It is estimated this process will take around six to nine months and then a panel will be formed to review the findings and produce the blueprint.

Dr Lance O'Sullivan, a doctor practising and living in his community of Kaitaia, is one of the New Zealand Think Tank members.

"I wanted to be involved with the Glenn Inquiry because I believe their approach is the right tone. Any strategy has to involve the communities and be culturally appropriate (whanau, hapu and iwi) from the start of its development through to the implementation. There is no value in a strategy being fully developed in Wellington and then being rolled out by local providers in Kaitaia. Generally those providing the service don't have buy in to strategies that they didn't have a hand in developing and this is evident by the end user. This Inquiry is desperately needed and I am passionate about being

part of it."
Similarly to the international appointees, the New Zealanders have generously agreed to contribute their time to the inquiry at no or heavily discounted fees.

Sir Owen Glenn has committed not only funds to this independent inquiry but much of his time also. "I will be in New Zealand a great deal this year. I'm committed to this Inquiry and it is my aim to produce a blueprint, which will be a model for the future that will answer one fundamental question 'If New Zealand was leading

the world in addressing child abuse and domestic violence what would that look like?' We owe this to our children and our grandchildren; we must reverse these ghastly statistics."

Glenn says the calibre of the Think Tank members both from New Zealand and overseas is outstanding. "To have these sorts of people committed is a huge boost but we still have a lot of work to do, we are just beginning. We are not going away, rest assured you be hearing a great deal about this Inquiry in 2013."

The Glenn Inquiry wants to hear from anyone who has personal experience of child abuse or domestic violence or work with those who do or who has time, energy or expertise or wishes to donate financially to help the Glenn Inquiry. A WORD OF ADVICE: Dos and Don'ts

The high street may be awash with post-Christmas sales, but every day's a sale online. Websites offering daily deals and group buys have exploded. We can grab, group and treat ourselves all year long. And why not? There's a bounty of choice—and at some undeniably good prices: surf lessons, car accessories, luxury facials; photo canvases, house cleaning services; half-price trip to the dentist anyone?

"Daily deals' run until a specified number of sales is reached or until the end of the day (whichever comes first). Group buying sites work on economies of scale; a certain number of people must sign up for an offer to become

available.
It's all good stuff. However not all 'deals' are created equal. Both the Commerce Commission and Consumer Affairs regularly receive complaints from customers who have used these discount sites and have found their hopes of a bargain going askew.

As with anything, exercise a bit of savvy and you're more likely to avoid the common pitfalls. These five do's and don'ts should help you on

your way:
Do: Check if the deal is as good as it says it is. It only takes a minute to do an internet search. Find out what the company would normally charge for the same item. Sometimes the discount isn't as much as you're led to believe. If the discount is exaggerated, or any of the other information is misleading, you can report the company to the Commerce Commission. And don't forget to compare the deal with prices from other

companies. You may find a better deal elsewhere.

Don't: stand for poor quality. Even goods and services that are on sale are covered by the Consumer Guarantees Act. That means goods must be of an acceptable quality and fit for particular purpose. Services must be provided with reasonable care and skill. So, if the hair straighteners you bought overheat after just six months, you can ask to have them repaired or replaced – if that's not possible, you can ask for a refund.

Do: Resist the urge to buy on impulse. Daily deal sites rely on our appetite for a bargain. They also create a sense of urgency. This wily combination makes us much more likely to act without thinking. Before snapping up an offer, just take five. Will you really use that Belgian waffle-making set or those retro curling tongs?

Don't: Be fobbed off. If you have a problem with something you've bought, you can ask either the discount site or the provider to put it right. If the discount site sends you directly to the provider, they may be misleading you about your rights – in which case you can make a complaint to the Commerce Commission or take a case to the Disputes Tribunal.

A common problem is when companies are overwhelmed by a large number of orders. For example, you buy a voucher for a fishing trip but, because of the high demand, there are no charters available until after the voucher has expired. If this happens you could ask to use the voucher at a later date, and if that's not possible for your money

back.

Do: Read the terms and conditions. If the barbecue kit you ordered in summer still hasn't arrived and the mountains are peaking with snow, you would be within your rights to ask for refund. But if the terms a conditions stated that the delivery time would be certain number of week months when you placed your order then you have accepted that you will wait that long.

Monarch butterflies aplenty

Rex Langton has planted so many Swan plants on the lake end of his 3 Layard Street property that they -have formed a hedge, which skirts the walkway around the Opunake Lake. The result is a proliferation of Monarch butterflies. About 30 of these colourful butterflies swarm

in the vicinity of the Swan plant hedge. Also to be seen are the large colourful striped Monarch caterpillars, as well as a number of chrysalises.

Rex is keen that as many people as possible see these butterflies, which are natives of North America, particularly Mexico, according to from the walkway.

Rex is an enthusiast of the butterflies and has been promoting their breeding by planting Swan plants for the nine years he has owned the Opunake property, which is opposite the Opunake Cottage Rest Home. Previous to living in Opunake he also continued his active interest in the butterflies on his farm for a further 20 years or so.

Surprisingly, the hedge plants have only been growing for two years, so the conditions for growth must be optimal to say the least.

Rex says the eggs are laid on the plants as early as August, chrysalises start forming in November and after about three weeks the Monarch butterflies emerge. "It's good for people to see them", he comments.



Although about thirty Monarch butterflies were flying in the vicinity of the Swan plant hedge, they seemed a bit

classroom for six weeks to learn the requirements of the new position within Ministry of Agriculture and Forestry. Based at Ruakura, Newstead, Hamilton, the return to a classroom situation with six other newbies, most of whom were the same age as my children, was a new experience. We all got on well but getting the room temperature comfortable for everyone, without being conducive to sleep, was an ongoing challenge. On this month in history

On January 4, 1958 Sir Edmund Hillary arrived at the geographic South Pole, as leader of his New Zealand team. This was the first overland trip to the South Pole since Captain Robert Falcon Scott in 1912. Sir Edmund's team had taken 80 days to complete the 1,930 kilometre journey, using three tractors, a caboose and two sledges.

The overall expedition leader was Sir Vivian 'Bunny' Fuchs (Britain), who had requested Sir Edmund and his men wait for

him at a certain stage, but the New Zealander elected to forge on ahead and was not too popular in some - mostly British circles. As Sir Edmund reached the South Pole, Sir Vivian was 322km behind him.

"Most of the equipment had to be replaced and rebuilt due to moisture content and corrosion during transit from South Africa to New Zealand," says Ashley, explaining this has postponed the launching of the business. The rebuild included research and development into later technology, hardware and software. "I had to completely rebuild all of our computer systems," says Ashley.

"We're just about ready to go, and we have recorded various events in Taranaki with our replaced equipment, the results have proven successful. We have recorded locally, a wedding, a funeral, a documentary, an advertising and marketing presentation, a live music recording in a busy New Plymouth shopping centre, a live performance recording at the festival of lights, and various other entertainment

The installation of gas and electricity

When you're building or renovating your home, getting the gas and electrical installations sorted is one of the big things to tick off your checklist. New electrical sockets may need to be installed, heaters fixed to the wall, cookers wired in and so on. The key thing to remember is safety first.

Before you hire a tradesperson, even for simple repairs or replacement, make sure that they're a licensed electrician or gasfitter. You can ask to see their licence, or check to see if someone is licensed through the Electrical Workers Registration Board (www. ewrb.govt.nz) and Plumbers Gasfitters and Drainlayers Board websites (www.pgdb.

Don't forget to keep copies of certification, receipts and invoices relating to gas and

electrical work in a safe place - and that you'll remember where they are in six months'

At the moment, certifying gas and electrical installation work is mandatory for most work, but not for repairs and replacement. However, from July 2013, consumers will always be entitled to get a Safety Certificate for all gas and electrical installation work. This will make it easier for consumers to get redress if any gas and electrical installations and repairs are not up

New laws will also mean that any work that is classified as high-risk - such as the connection of a new home to a gas or electricity supply - will have to be registered on a new publicly available database run by the Ministry

of Business, Innovation and

Employment. So you'll be able to check that you're satisfied with the records being kept for 'high risk' installations in your home.

Registered electricians and gasfitters are audited by their relevant registration boards and other regulators. You have the right to complain to those boards if you're not happy with the quality of work you receive.

If you have any concerns about poor quality or unsafe electrical or gas installation work that has been done in your home, you should first raise it with your electrician or gasfitter. If you can't reach an agreement on how to sort things out, take your complaint to the Electrical Workers Registration Board (EWRB) or Plumbers Gasfitters and Drainlayers Board (PGDB).

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DairyNZ supports DCD suspension

Industry body DairyNZ has come out in support of Ravensdown and Ballance Agri-Nutrients' voluntary suspension of sales and use Dicyandiamide (DCD) treatment on farm land until further notice. However, DairyNZ Chief Executive Tim Mackle is urging the

two companies, government authorities and dairy companies to work on pragmatic solutions that would enable the product to be back on the market and able to be used by farmers. "We support this proactive approach to managing the trade risk, but this is a very useful tool

for farmers in terms of managing their nutrient loss on farms, so we'd like to see solutions worked on as a priority," he says.Dr Mackle says there is a suite of tools farmers can use instead of DCD to manage nitrogen loss and its effect on water quality, so farmers will be actively focussed on those in the meantime. "We're doing a lot of research on other measures to manage nutrient loss so there are other options. But DCD is a particularly effective one so we hope that a solution can be worked on to enable it to be used.'

\$5000 Lincoln University research scholarship

withdrawn products were seen as a means of helping reduce dairying's impact on water by reducing the amount of diffuse nitrogen pollution leaching off farms and into waterways. Mr Johnson says in their absence regional councils must not lower pollution targets and instead should put the onus on the farmers to adhere to environmental guidelines and reduce the impact by other means. "If that requires a reduction in production, then so be it." Lesser options that could as-

sist include using less fertiliser and using it more efficiently, upgrading irrigation systems and increasing riparian margins adjacent to flowing waters," he says. "The individual farmers affected by this should meet the costs associated with ensuring that they aren't polluting the public's freshwater resource. That's what would be required of any other business the dairy sector should not be treated as a special case and demands for yet more environmental subsidies should be flatly rejected by regional councils and the government."

World Wetlands Day coming to Te Wawa

example of the importance of wetlands and the challenges involved in their restoration and enhancement will be on public show to mark World Wetlands Day on Sunday February 3.

Te Wawa Wetland, just north of Oakura, will be the venue for a field day allowing visitors to inspect reptile species, including the area first-hand and to hear about its value and the work that still needs to be done.

The 4.8 ha wetland, on properties leased from **PKW** Incorporation by John Washer and Neil Maulder, is the habitat of a number of threatened and endangered bird and

the Australasian bittern, the spotless crake and the goldstriped gecko. Its vegetation includes raupo reed and flax, as well as a small coastal forest remnant containing kawakawa, mahoe, karamu and lancewood. It is also close to a pa site.

A major priority at the wetland is management of pest plants and further investigation of animal life, particularly fish and aquatic invertebrates. This work forms part of a Conservation and Biodiversity Plan for the property, drawn up by the Taranaki Regional Council in consultation with the owners and leaseholders.

Te Wawa Wetland is listed as a Regionally Significant Wetland and a Key Native Ecosystem by the Council.

As well as a tour of the wetland, Sunday's field day will include addresses by the Taranaki Regional Council Chairman, David MacLeod, who is also on the board of PKW, and representatives of Forest and Bird, OEII National Trust, Taranaki Tree Trust and the Department of Conservation.

The field day starts at 10am. The property is on Koru Road, off SH45 north of Oakura, will be signposted from the highway. Bring good walking shoes, hat and sunblock, and water or juice.


Kids - if they're old enough to be at the gig, they're \$20 and if they will be tucked up in bed not long after dinner, then they're free as long as someone's responsible for

On this month in history

On January 21, 1930 an alpine guide Teddy Blomfield and four women died on the Tasman Glacier near Mt Cook. This was New Zealand's worst alpine tragedy up until that time.

The guide was in his early twenties and was also a medical student. The mystery was how the party succumbed so quickly and

early theories that exposure caused the deaths have been challenged by others suggesting that lightning was the main factor.
